ARRIVE REVIVED

Ping-ponging across the oceans nay sound glamorous, but as every raveller knows, it plays havoc with your sleep. TRAVELPRO MAXLITE 4 CARRY-ON

Travelling light starts with the ideal carry-on bag, and you don't want it to weigh you down before you load it up. The Travelpro Maxlite 4 carry-on weighs less than 2.6 kilograms, but it's tough enough to keep you rolling smoothly. Inside, two compartments and lots of pockets and straps will keep you organized, and the bag is expandable if you get carried away shopping. Canadian prices are \$154 to \$196, depending on whether you choose two or four wheels. *Joanne Blain*

NECK PILLOW

PASHMINA

The one thing I never travel without is a soft cashmere wrap such as a pashmina, or a large scarf. I always have one in my carry-on bag. I use it primarily to wrap myself up on the plane to stave off the inevitable chilliness of the cabin. Once there, it immediately dresses up any outfit, from evening attire to a pair of jeans. CLOTHESLINE

Not every hotel room comes equipped with a clothesline, and Flexo-Line's travel clothesline doubles as a flexible band to stretch your legs — elastic band stretching is used in workouts — and is mandatory after a long flight.
